Discussion Questions

- 1. What is the human cost of war and political repression?
- 2. In what way does the presentation of this book (a story told in black & white pictures) add to the narrative of the story?
- 3. In her introduction to *Persepolis*, Satrapi explains that she wrote this book to show that Iran is not only a country of "fundamentalism, fanaticism, and terrorism." How does Satrapi go about challenging this myth?
- 4. How did the revolution exert power and influence over so many people, including many educated and middle class people like Satrapi's parents?
- 5. Why do you think Marjane's parents sent her off to Austria while they stayed in Tehran? Why don't they leave/escape as well?
- 6. "In spite of everything, kids were trying to look hip, even under risk of arrest." (p. 112) what do you think you would have done had you been a child in this environment?
- 7. What do you think Satrapi is saying about religion's effect on the individual and society?
- **8.** How are the Islamic fundamentalists represented in the book? What suggestions does Satrapi make about the relationship between faith and fanaticism?
- 9. What does the book suggest about the role of religion in Iranian culture, especially in the lives of people like Marjane's family?
- 10. How does the author describe the distinctions between the classes before and after the revolution?
- 11. Discuss the role of religion in Iran. How does Marjane's perception of religion change?
